1. What is the Partner Grant Support Program (PGSP)?

It is a global program to support the wider climate movement – as part of an overall interest in greater movement equity. The existence of highly connected, loud, global movement organizations often cause a restriction of resources for local groups operating in the same sphere. Consequently, the purpose of the Global Grants Program is to support

- a. Frontline fights against fossil fuels,
- b. Climate impacted communities,
- c. Campaigns promoting solutions initiatives
- d. Other under-resourced climate activist groups,

by providing small grants to help them achieve self determined, specific and time limited goals. The program will run for two years (based on the amount of funding we have raised for this purpose). The program is run by 350.org and Global Greengrants Fund. See criteria for more details.

2. What is eligible for funding under PGSP?

Some examples are:

- Organising capacity costs: stipends for organisers for a fixed period, clearly and specifically focused on a defined event/mobilisation.
- Material and consultation costs for solutions projects.
- Climate Impacts resiliation building and recovery projects
- Promotional materials costs: fliers, posters, materials for "artbuilds" at actions
- Direct event costs: venue, housing, food, equipment, materials, banners, translation support, etc.
- Documentation costs: video, photo, etc.
- Web costs: high speed internet, mail programs, (though we encourage all applicants to rely on free tools whenever possible).
- Ground travel costs (for organisers, facilitators, speaker scholarships, and/or participants)
- Other: if your project needs are not listed here, please clearly describe them in your proposal and explain how they differ from what is listed here.

3. What is not eligible for funding under PGSP?

These are not normally covered:

- Air travel for event speakers/participants (subject to exceptions when alternative mode of transportation is not readily available and/or is significantly more expensive than ground travel particular instances of this should be stated in the application).
- Organiser stipends for an openended period of time.
- Paid advertising.

4. Who is eligible for funding under PGSP?

Applicants falling under one of the categories under Question 1 above, with a yearly organizational budget of less than US\$250.000, are eligible for this program.

5. What is the upper limit for a grant?

Each project will be evaluated on its own merits and on a case by case basis. Individual grants can range from a few hundred dollars to thousands. However, bear in mind that this is a small grants program in essence.

6. Are multi year grants possible?

Yes. The program can provide grants covering a maximum of 2 year period. For grants with a final deadline longer than a year a midterm report of activities is required before the release of the second portion of a grant.

6. How Do I Apply?

First, read the <u>criteria document</u> on what the program supports. Once that's done, make sure to speak with the 350.org representative who recommended the program to you. They will be able to help you frame your application (although the actual paperwork is up to you). Once you read the criteria and consult, an Organizational Information Form will be sent to you for you to complete and submit to <u>proposals@350.org</u>. Please complete this form clearly and without any omissions. Here is a <u>brief checklist</u> for you.

7. We have applied now what happens?

Thanks! If your project is in line with program goals and criteria it will be evaluated shortly. If there is missing information or if clarifications are required, you will be contacted about those. The final outcome of your application is based on clarity of goals and strength of theory of change, as well as budget and equity of geographical distribution. The result of your application may take up to two weeks (once the final version has been submitted) to be communicated. Awarded grants will be processed by Global Greengrants Fund (350.org's partner in this project). Actual processing time and transfer of grant may change from region to region but takes a few weeks for most.

8. Our grant has been approved, now what?

Congratulations and good luck with your project! We would love to keep up to date with the output of your plans and help share your stories, let us know. Here is a really helpful piece on <u>digital storytelling</u> (storytelling cards at the end are especially helpful).

9. How about reporting?

Once your project is complete, we will need a final report of activities. The report form will be sent to you. You do not need to submit individual receipts of expenses.
